

One of the greatest gifts we can give to our community, nation, and world is to behave like owners rather than visitors. If we live like visitors, we dwell here, but don't accept most of the responsibility, or bear the cost. Visitors are temporary, behave like guests, and eventually plan to move on leaving behind responsibility for the future and upkeep of a community or home. Owners, on the other hand, bear the responsibility and future wellbeing of a place. Owners invest.

The season of Advent is an invitation to experience our faith, our church community, and world as owners. The Kingdom of God is at hand, even as we benefit and share together a world that we did not create, but have become beneficiaries to and responsible for on a daily basis.

Why the Advent Wreath?

Celebrating with an Advent wreath during the weeks prior to Christmas is a great way for Christian familiesto keep Christ at the center of Christmas, and for parents to teach their children the true meaning of Christmas.

The Advent wreath is a circular garland of evergreen branches representing eternity. On that wreath, five candles are typically arranged. During the season of Advent one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday as a part of the Advent services. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord, Jesus Christ. Set on the branches of the wreath are four candles: three purple candles and one pink candle. In the center of the wreath sits a white candle. As a whole, these candles represent the coming of the light of Christ into the world.

On the first Sunday of Advent, the first purple candle is lit. This candle is typically called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, primarilyIsaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ. This candle represents hope or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah.

On the second Sunday of Advent, the second purple candle is lit. This candle typically represents love. Some traditions call this the "Bethlehem Candle," symbolizing Christ's manger.

On the third Sunday of Advent the pink, or rose-colored candle is lit. This pink candle is customarily called the "Shepherds Candle" and it represents joy.

The fourth and last purple candle, oftentimes called the "Angels Candle," represents peace and is lit on the fourth Sunday of Advent.

On Christmas Eve, the white center candle is traditionally lit. This candle is called the "Christ Candle" and represents the life of Christ that has come into the world. The color white represents purity. Christ is the sinless, spotless, pure Savior. Also, those who receive Christ as Savior are washed of their sins andmade whiter than snow.
