

The Old Testament Scripture documents the history of the Nation of Israel, from the roots of a family in one land, to the development of a nation in another. Centuries of history reveals ups and downs in relationship to God, each other, and the surrounding nations. Their history of captivity in Egypt, the miraculous exodus under Moses' leadership, the wilderness experience, the journey to the promise land, and their exile from the promise land is a story filled with struggle and redemption. As we look to a new season together, we can keep our blessings and fortunate place in this world on the forefront of our minds. Furthermore, we can consider the many opportunities in our church body to bless others in the name of Jesus. Finally, we can remember that each of our lives contributes to the pages of human history, and when we do our part to fulfill our God-given mission, we return thanks to our Lord. During the upcoming holiday season of feasting and celebration, we can take specific action to feed and nourish our soul. When we receive, we can consistently return thanks by sharing what we receive with someone else. We can have the attitude that what we have is a gift of God, not for our boasting. We can remember that who we are and what we possess is available to others. Finally we can remember that what is most significant in life is of eternal value and is cared for by God.
