

A bold question to ask, but worthy of our time and reflection is, "What makes God angry?" The answer(s) are printed clearly in our scripture and can definitely be applied to our current day, and world circumstances. In the Old Testament we read of God singling out a family, which later evolved into a nation, for the purpose of establishing a covenant relationship. The Hebrew people were clearly in the heart of God, and at the same time often were the subject of God's anger. The purpose of their special attention was to become a demonstration to the world of God's promise; a promise from which they would benefit, and respond to with their fidelity. Their responsibility was two-fold: (1) to trust in God alone to meet their daily needs, and (2) to treat one another fairly and with respect. In response, God would fulfill their needs and provide for the whole nation, equitably. And, consequently their neighbors would see the truth of God, and follow in like manner.

The covenant broke down immediately. As God began to provide for food and national security, the people began to hoard and store up provisions, which consequently spoiled. And, rather than trusting God for security, begged for a military leader similar to other nations, rather than trusting in the providence of God. In short, taking matters into their own hands. Their lack of trust in God became a lack of trust in one another and led to typical behavior of a non-trusting environment; manipulation of resources, stealing, and cheating one another. All hell (separation from God) broke loose, and the covenant people, who were the object of God's desiring, eventually found themselves the object of God's wrath. What makes God angry? Broken promises and placing our trust, first, in anything other than our Lord. Similarly, treating one another in any way that diminishes dignity and honor.

In the New Testament we read of God's desire to reconcile. This reconciliation was for more than one nation alone. This reconciliation was for all nations and all people, and came through the life and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. The hope for the world was through faith and trust in one God for all humanity. The earliest followers of Christ assembled and became the seed of what we practice today through our faith in one Lord. Setting all doctrinal and denominational differences aside, the heart of God is for all people to Love the Lord with all our heart, and love one another as we are so loved by our Creator.

Any yet, we still struggle. The foundation of our struggle as people has and continues to be trust in the Lord. Trust for our security, fulfillment, and relating with one another in a fair and dignified way.

What makes God angry? To break the covenant promise that our Creator will be our God, and we become the people and object of God's desiring. As we grieve together waring nations, national leaders flexing ego and aggression rather than diplomacy and cooperation, natural disasters flooding entire communities, as well as our greed and manipulation resulting in poverty and suffering, we too cry out for a reconciliation to God. What makes God angry is our giving into the temptation to take matters into our own hands rather than trusting in our Creator to provide. What we can do as a first step is to posture ourselves in a place to receive. This takes humility and trust, but is the necessary first step to becoming a reconciliation force to God in the world. As we receive, we are so inspired to share. It is in our sharing that we truly realize our purpose: To be God's people, receiving and sharing the blessings of God.
