One of the greatest and most profound possessions we can own is our responsibility. As Christians, we do have a responsibility for what we have and even more so what we become. Much of scripture is dedicated to how we prioritize our lives. We are told that we possess deeply rooted spiritual gifts from God, and that when we realize what we have, and develop what we have, we will bless the world. Our responsibility is to identify and develop what we have been given by God. Teaching, encouraging, preaching, ministering, giving, leading, and compassion are a few listed in the book of Romans. I also believe that the same can be said for the material resources and opportunities in our life. Simply put, when we have resources at our disposal, how we spend them and share them matter to our Lord.

In the twenty-fifth chapter of Matthew, a story is recorded where Jesus spoke of a man going on an extended trip. He called his workers together and gave them sums of money to manage while he went away. He gave one five talents, another two talents, and to a third, one talent, each in proportion to his ability. A talent was equal to about fifteen years of wages for a common worker in that day. After a long absence he returned and the servants settled accounts with him. The first had multiplied his talents exponentially. The second doubled what he had. The third, however, buried his talent and there was no growth on what he had been given. He followed up this burial with one excuse after another. Next, each of the workers was assessed and the first two praised for their work. The third, however, was thrown out into the darkness and despised.

This parable should cause each of us to pause and think deeply about our life and the meaning of it in Christian faith. First, I have given thought to what a talent represents. I do think the parable is literally talking about money. The currency of the day could be traded for goods and services in similar fashion to how we use it today. And, how we apply what we have to the needs of the world matters to God. Also, I believe it is talking about talent defined as the bounty of life. Consider how miraculously we are created. This is the good news. The even better news is that we have been given a wealth of liberty and potential in our lives. The great expectations that exist on our behalf occur because our creator knows what we are and what we can become. On that thought, I encourage you to think about the spirit of God and the forming of God's kingdom on earth as an attainable goal, but also as one that will stretch our faith and life beyond human measure. What I have learned from people is that *we risk the most when we care the deepest and believe whole-heartedly.* I am amazed at the risk I have seen in people's lives when their heart is engaged. Our lives will reflect the depth of our hope. On the other hand, if we are not engaged or impassioned by a cause or investment in our life, we will pull back, live an aloof faith life, and never see the true reward that our God hopes for each of us to see.

As we move together in a new year with certainty and uncertainty abounding, I ask that we think deeply about how we will embrace new opportunities for living faithfully and sharing the generosity our Lord has entrusted to us. We all have so much to give, and now is an opportune time to put into practice a renewed celebration of life, sharing, and abundance from our God.
